THE CURRENT STATE OF OUR YOUTH The trends are unsettling...

The challenges faced by young people living in economically disadvantaged communities are numerous, and have been exacerbated by the effects of the pandemic. In these neighborhoods. children are negatively impacted by higher levels of trauma, violence, negative peer pressure, and relationship insecurity.

Our entire model is fueled by knowing: relationships change everything.

The Search Institute, a leading youth research organization, has identified **five foundational elements** needed to create strong developmental relationships with adults ("The Developmental Relationships Framework"). The Elevate Teacher Mentor Model uses this same framework to create an environment where students can be resilient and thrive:

- >> Teacher Mentors Express Care
- >> Teacher Mentors Challenge Them to Grow
- >> Teacher Mentors Provide Support to them
- >> Teacher Mentors Share Power with them
- >> Teacher Mentors Expand Their Possibilities

ELEVATE OUTCOMES Before and After 3 Semesters

Elevate USA engaged Excellence in Giving, a recognized research and evaluation organization, to conduct an overall program evaluation. They identified six critical measures proven to have significant and long-lasting implications for a student's future.

Each of the outcomes below is measured when Elevate enters a city, and then after students complete three semesters of the program. The insight in the subsequent pages illustrates the measurable impact of Elevate on a student population, and demonstrates the program's ability to improve the lives and futures of youth in low-opportunity neighborhoods.


Excellence in Giving draws strong correlations of these items to graduation rates, academic performance, college attendance, and career earnings.







BEATING THE ODDS Brandan Louis, Former Elevate Orlando Student

Brandan Louis is the only one of his four siblings to be born in the U.S.. His mother and siblings moved to the states in the 90s, where they called Orlando, Florida their new home. From a young age, Brandan was up against significant barriers that would keep him from thriving – from growing up without a father figure, to watching one brother get incarcerated and another brother getting tragically killed – he was beginning to go down a similar path of troublesome behavior. Between the ages of 13 and 15, he found himself with an extremely low GPA and dealing with the consequences of a mistake that got him into significant legal trouble.


Once Brandan entered high school, everything began to change. High school is when he was introduced to Elevate Orlando, and specifically the Teacher Mentors that would help change the trajectory of his life. His Teacher Mentors walked alongside him, which helped raise his GPA and transformed him into a leader with a vision for his life. Just a few years later, Brandan received a full ride scholarship to Florida State University where he will soon graduate with a finance degree, and already has job offers lined up. He is still close with his Teacher Mentors and keeps in touch with them to this day. The caring, long-term relationships that Elevate brought Brandan unlocked the potential that was always inside of him, developing him into the thriving contributor he is today.
